



HULL JEWISH COMMUNITY CARE (HJCC)

TU B'SHEVAT SEDER

Tu B'Shevat, the New Year for Trees, falls on the 15th of Shevat. Jewish tradition marks the 15th of Shevat as the day when the sap in the trees begins to rise, signalling the earth's awakening from its winter slumber, and heralding the beginning of Spring. This mini-holiday is of major importance to our appreciation of Nature and our relationship to it.

To celebrate this festival, there will be a Tu B'Shevat Seder held on **Tuesday evening 30 January 2018** starting at **7.00pm** at which we will drink wine, eat fruit and sing songs. Everyone is welcome to attend and join in.

SYNAGOGUE COUNCIL MEETING

15 December 2017

Present - Andy Harbert (Chair), Joanne Kearsley (Secretary), Aimi Sugarman (Treasurer), Phil O'Driscoll, Audrey Sugarman, Henry Goldstone, Malcolm Rosenberg, Jim Lightowler and Elaine Winetroube.

Business

In response to Elaine's query regarding the late Warren Winetroube's donation, the Chair explained that it was the Shul's intention to purchase silverware for the Torah Scrolls. These would be dedicated in his memory at some point in the future.

The Chair reported that seventy people, both Jewish and non-Jewish, had attended the Balfour Declaration presentation given by Robin Moss of UJIA on 16 November 2017, which had been held in the Shul hall. The event was enjoyed by everyone there. He also reported the sad loss of Janette Dubb after a long illness. Janette's funeral, which had been held at the Haltemprice Crematorium, had been extremely well-attended. One of the Torah mantels had been beautifully embroidered in memory of the late Geoff Annis. Finally, he reported that Peter Altoft had now stepped down from the service rota, but was still involved in school visits.

The Secretary reported, that following her correspondence to 'The Watchman' regarding Michael Bott's inaccurate, inappropriate and possibly inflammatory comments, she had received an e-mail from him explaining his reasons for his comments. She had responded to him by e-mail and would be posting copies of all of the e-mails relating to this matter, received and sent, on the Shul notice board.

The Treasurer reported that the Shul's finances continued to be healthy and all contributions for the High Holy Days Appeal for the Leo Baeck College had now been collected and a cheque sent from the Shul to the Movement for Reform Judaism. The Council was informed that Christine Joseph-Jay was now under the guidance of Rabbi Debbie Young-Summers who would carry out her final interview. Gill Drummond was awaiting her final interview from Rabbi Danny Rich. Both hoped to be interviewed by the Be'it Din in early 2018.

The Council agreed to the naming of an "Ian Sugarman Classroom" in gratitude for all his selfless commitment to the Shul over many years.

The Chair reported that there would be a Chanukah party at the Pryme Street Shul on Sunday 17 December 2017 at 1.30pm. A defibrillator training event would be held at the Pryme Street Shul on Sunday 14 January at 10.15am. Another film show has been arranged for Sunday 21 January 2018 at 2.30pm. The film to be shown will be "The Zoo Keeper's Wife". The next Friday Night Open Service has been planned for 23 February 2018. A discussion on 'Combating Loneliness' is due to be held at the West London Synagogue on 22 March 2018 and the RSY sleepover will be held at Ne've Shalom on 23-24th March 2018.

The Chair agreed to arrange an in-house training event covering the 'Use of a defibrillator' and 'Basic life support skills'. The event would take place in early 2018. The new water boiler for the kitchen, which had been kindly donated by Hull Jewish Community Care, was ready to be installed.

WHAT IS JANUARY WITHOUT TU B'SHEVAT?

Tu B'Shevat, Tu B'Shevat
You ain't in the Chumash
Or the Tanach
But I like you a lot
Tu B'Shevat, Tu B'Shevat.

January is not a Jewish month. The only thing Jewish about January is maybe Tu B'Shevat - a minor league event compared to say - Awesome Yom Kippur. Tu B'Shevat is a holiday like an onion slice is an entree at your Shabbat supper. I don't even know how Tubee (as my good friend, Herb, calls it) made holiday status.

The other day after services I asked my Rabbi. "Rabbi," I said, "why do we observe Tu B'Shevat?"

"We do?" he declared.

"Sure, Rabbi, Tu B'Shevat is usually late January/early February, you know."

"Oh yeah," he said. "Uh, Tubee what? How do you spell it?"

Our difficulty proved to be a simple communication problem. I was working on a large mouthful of lox and bagel and he simply couldn't understand me. That's what he said. Once I described it with a mouth dedicated to speech and cleared of lox and bagel he knew all about it. It's the fifteenth day of Shevat and it's sort of a celebration of trees. A New Year celebration for trees, as it's described in the Jewish encyclopaedia.

And even though it doesn't rank up there with Rosh Hashanah or Chanukah or even your nephew, Danny's, Barmitzvah, I'm sort of fond of Tu B'Shevat. There's not a lot of rules - there's not even the obligatory food item. It's a mix and match holiday. You like bean and barley soup? Have a bowl for breakfast on the morning of Tube. You like to dip a nice slice of buttered rye in your soup? Fine. Anything goes on Tube.

Ceremonially, tree planting is the traditional thing to do. The kids love it. In fact, you can begin your Tube ceremony in October by collecting acorns.

"Why are we putting acorns in that bag?" says little Ezra, my grandson.

"I'm getting ready for Tu B'Shevat."

Here, Ezra does a great imitation of my rabbi. "Tube what?" This is your cue to give him the standard explanation, plus a treatise on the wonders of the Creator's universe - how a 5-gram acorn will turn into a 50-ton Oak with the blessings of rain and earth and time.

Then tell him you're gathering these seeds to plant on the big day in late January. And when it rolls around, you and Ezra, armed with a hand digger, find a sunny spot in the backyard and plant your acorns. Remember that nature extravagantly provides the mama Salmon with 100,000 eggs so she'll have five or six kids to gladden her old age. It's the same with oak trees. So, plant a bunch of acorns. Maybe two or three will sprout in Spring.

If you've properly educated Ezra, he'll sit by the den window and watch for the seedlings like poverty-stricken writers wait for the mailman - with the cheque from the New Yorker.

Then one day in Spring, when you least expect it, a few green shoots will come up to tentatively explore their new world. Go get Ezra. I promise you his eyes will pop wider than the time you uncrated his new video game.

After a little watering and weeding, you and him go and have a bowl of bean and barley soup. It's all a part of Tu B'Shevat. Almost anything goes.

A FEAST OF IDEAS

This year's national Limmud Festival 2017 took place in Birmingham between 24 to 28 December. The event attracted 2,500 participants from 23 countries and, on offer, there were over 1,000 sessions of diverse educational topics and discussions. Our Roving Reporter, Jackie Lukes, was there and we thank her for the following report.

What better to do in 'Crimbo Limbo', the week of torment for shopaholics and news addicts between Christmas and new year's eve, than take a magic carpet trip through centuries to exotic enthralling distant lands?

With snow outside and 'all you can eat' inside, Limmud has been a week of 'Betwixtmas Bliss' in Birmingham.

For a week I've been absorbed in Geonic era 8th/9th to 11th Century cross-currents of ideas, customs and practice, a cross-fertilization and mutual exchange of laws and patterns of life between the Jewish and Muslim worlds of the time in Babylonia and beyond. Prof. Gideon Libson and others have been uncovering these fascinating mutual and reciprocal influences from ancient Egyptian and Arabic texts and comparative analysis of the laws in them.

Neither side, Jewish or Muslim, seems to have been as rigidly unchanging as we thought, though it takes ingenuity to show this as both sides declared they were rigidly impervious to change. The same sort of Jewish/Muslim comparative analysis with chapter and verse filled more sessions during the week both on earlier times and later, especially in 12th and 13th century Spain with Maimonides and Crescas and their different, really opposite interpretations of the parable of the castle, uncovered by Dr. Zev Warren Harvey. Everything was, and still is, a matter for debate and argument, which adds to the enjoyment. Imagine conversations with Maimonides, Rabbi Judah Halevi, Ibn ben Pakuda, Ghazzali - these medieval people were there!

Swirling through each day have been seminars and talks sweeping us back like a tidal wave to the first two centuries of the current era, the time of the second Temple's destruction in the year 70CE and the Roman empire, with ferments of debate among the sages and between them and all sorts of rebellious and new groups and schools of thought.

For example, Dr. Yaffa Epstein ran daily paired-learning sessions on "Rabbinic Rebels and Rebellious Rabbis: Understanding Authority in the Talmud"; Mordechai Zeller gave us "Overcoming moral dissonance through Midrashic interpretation: the disturbing case of the captive woman" (about a slavery law that Ian Sugarman did a workshop on).

Dr. Zeller also illuminated the mid-day of Yom Kippur with "The Secret Journey of the High Priest: Narnia and the Hekhalot"; and Dr. Yarden Raber offered "Others and Otherness in Rabbinic Literature: Was Idolatry a Source of Ritual Defilement?" a powerful case which he skilfully related to the current day. Dr. Chaim Hames with texts from the apocrypha and new and old testaments offered a profound series of insights in "Why did Jesus and Rabbi Akiva have to meet Moses?"

Sessions on "Holy War - the Jewish view" were as learned and alarming as those on the Muslim view of it. We weren't spared "Luther and the Jews" and plenty of others on anti-Semitism then and now but Dr. Raphael Zarum stretched minds marvellously and constructively with "Confucius, Ezra and Socrates - how to rebuild": a star performance like his others.

I'm only mentioning a few as it was in for a penny, in for a pound - I went to sessions every minute of every day, and some discussions into the night. With some 2,500 participants from 23 countries and over 1,000 sessions, it was virtually 24/7, round the clock.

This year it's a festival, not just a conference as music, arts and 'mind and body' sessions wove their way through the academic strands. You think you've planned until a Sephardi melody (Saffron and Sapphire the singers) reaches your ears or something unexpected pops up (like 'Overeaters Anonymous') - 'Man plans and God laughs!' It was like the equally wonderful 'World Transformed' conference in Brighton this autumn. There, 'crafternoons' lightened the weighty sessions, e.g. a real clay pottery class; here, 'crafternoons' included one on different recipes for hummus, making it not just talking about it.

What about the Limmud food? There was a Grab and Go sandwich tent out in the snow (welcome fresh air) and a fabulous queue for sit-down dining-room meals which produced interesting conversations and new friends. 'You have to be in the Lim-mood' to get the most out of everything, especially the queues.

What about jokes for Ian? Mostly it was puns and wordplay e.g. "Bored of Deputies" (title of session by its senior vice-president) and many wandering/wondering Jews. I liked Dr. Zarum's joke:

What's the best way of getting a free meal from a Rabbi? Say "I'm having doubts!" After he told this, a Rabbi said to him: "I'm thinking of going to the Pardes Institute for an interesting-looking course but it's Orthodox and I'm Reform, would I get in?" Rabbi Zarum: "Why don't you ask them?" The other replied: "I can't, I'm having certainties!"
