SYNAGOGUE COUNCIL MEETING 25 January 2019

Business

Chris, the caretaker, had now installed a light with a movement-sensor above the Shul entrance to make it easier for people to see the key pad in the dark. The Chair reported that Humber Watch Ltd would be shortly installing a new CCTV system to improve the Shul's current security. Malcolm reported that he had spoken with Norman Harrap & Son, a stained glass supplier, located in Spring Bank in Hull, to enquire about providing resinstained glass to imitate stained-glass windows for the Shul in memory of the late Warren Winetroube. Having spoken to them, it appeared that what they could provide was far too expensive and he would carry out further research online to find something more suitable, such as ready-made Perspex. Ian reported that the Watchman would be promoting the Shul's upcoming film afternoon for free.

The Chair thanked Aimi for organising the Tu B'Shevat Seder Service and reported that all those who had attended felt that it had been a lovely evening. He also reported that Laura Gold had been elected as the new President of the Hull Jewish Representative Council (HJRC) and that the HJRC would be sponsoring a barbecue to celebrate the anniversary of the creation of the State of Israel, which would be held at the Pryme Street Synagogue on Sunday 12 May 2019. The Chair also reported the death of Sydney Bush on 21 December 2018 and, on behalf of the Council, wished Ann, Sarita and all his family "Long Life".

The Chair announced that a MRJ seminar regarding Safeguarding would be taking place on Sunday 10 February 2019 at Jackson's Row Synagogue in Manchester. Aimi confirmed that she would be representing the Shul. The Chair also reported that he had received a letter from CST confirming that funds were now in place to pay for security services at the Shul until the end of March 2019.

The Chair announced that he was looking to give the small classroom a makeover. The classroom would be cleared of bookcases, decorated and furnished for use as a 'quiet room', where members could go to read or just relax, when required.

The Holocaust Memorial Service will be held at the Guildhall, Hull, on Sunday 27 January 2019 at 2.00pm and the next Friendly Circle will be held on Wednesday 20 February 2019 at 2.00pm at the Pryme Street Synagogue. The Friday Open Service will be held on 22 February 2019 at 7.00pm, whilst the Purim Service and Kiddush (Fancy Dress) will be held on Wednesday 20 March 2019 at 7.00pm. Another communal film show will be held on Sunday 24 March at 2.00pm and the film will be 'Yentl', starring Barbra Streisand. This year's Communal First Night Seder will be held on Friday 19 April at 6.30pm.

Following on from the previous discussions regarding a student Rabbi for the High Holy Days 5780, Council members reported that the consensus of opinion from members of the Shul was that they preferred the Shul's Lay Readers to conduct the Services. The Chair thanked the Council for their feedback from the members and said that he would inform MRJ of the Council's decision.

GETTING DRUNK ON PURIM: IS IT WORTH IT?

This feature article by Avi Lazerson was first published in the March 2014 edition of the Jewish magazine and discusses the need to be intoxicated on Purim.



Each year Rabbis come out and request that people drink within moderation on Purim even though the halachic requirement is to drink until one does not know the difference between "Cursed is Haman and Blessed is Mordachai." The reality of the situation is that many young people in yeshivas do get drunk and have much fun and do nothing sinful or dangerous. Yet for others, the thought of getting drunk is disgraceful and I happen to agree but within a certain frame work. Getting drunk during the year, meaning not during Purim is a reckless action that removes one's brains and mind from a person's actions. During the year it can be very harmful and lead to alcoholism.

Drunkenness should be avoided in all cases. Drunks are next to drug addicts on the bottom rungs of humanity. But on Purim, each person has the ability to use that normally

despicable pattern of behaviour to elevate his soul above the mundane. The ancient sages condoned, even encouraged, getting drunk this once. The reason being that often times we need a catalyst to enable us to push aside the facade of the physical world in order that we can apprehend the spiritual elements that exist side by side with the physical. The problem is that as we live our lives, we live them in accordance to the physical environment that surrounds us. We realise that there are doors to open to go in and out. There are walls that separate us from others. Food and drink are for sustaining and giving us a feeling of well being. Everything in our life is physical to the point that we begin to view life as chiefly being physical. The spiritual side, well, it may be somewhere, but who knows?



As one begins to drink on Purim, the drinking is done only for the purpose of fulfilling the Sages dictum "A person should drink on Purim until he does not know..." When the physical attraction of the world is diminished and spiritual side begins to beckon to you, you have realized that there is more to the world than the physical. Yes, although this may be a substance induced realization, still a spiritual experience is worth the hangover that is the next morning's badge of faith. Someone who cannot trust himself to drink sanely and safely has no business drinking. If a person is not careful with the mitzvot of G-d and he may come to transgress, he has no business drinking.

Each person must look into their own hearts and decide for themselves if they should drink or not. Remember, there is no sin in not drinking or not getting drunk, but there is one if one gets drunk and does something wrong.

ASK THE RABBI



Asktherabbi.org responds to the questions:

"Is it true that G-d is not mentioned in the Book of Esther? If so, why not? Why do we wear masks and dress up on Purim?"

Although the Book of Esther is part of the Bible, it never mentions the name of G-d, though there are veiled allusions. This surprising omission actually reflects a central theme of this holiday. On Purim we celebrate the fact that the hand of G-d guides us, even at times when we do not see open miracles or obvious Divine intervention. When we read the Megillah, we are not awestruck by dramatic changes in the laws of nature, but by a series of seemingly disconnected events that ultimately resulted in the salvation of the Jewish people.

King Ahasuerous executed his first wife and chose the beautiful Esther as his new queen. These are not miracles, but behaviour to be expected from a despotic king. Nor was it a miracle that Mordechai once saved the king from an assassination plot, thereby earning his gratitude. Each event, in and of itself, was not miraculous or even exceptional. When seen in retrospect however, the series of events is seen as engineered from Above for the purpose of evoking repentance from the Jewish people and then saving them from danger.

This theme of allusion may also be the reason behind the custom of wearing costumes on Purim. The masks and costumes show that truth always lies beneath the surface, that the physical world conceals the true spiritual reality.

Memorial prayers for the deceased will be recited during the Friday Night Service for those Yahrzeits which fall during the coming week. If a Yahrzeit falls on a Friday Night, please remember that the prayers will usually be recited during the Friday Night Service the week before.
