21 June 2019

Business

The Chair reported that the Shul had now produced a list of its Core Values, which would be published in the Shofar Shalom. Following the concerns raised at the previous AGM regarding the Shul's current compliance with Food Safety and Hygiene regulations, the Chair reported that a full implementation of the food hygiene requirements and guidelines had been completed and that the Shul was fully compliant with current the Food Safety and Hygiene regulations. He thanked all those involved in the implementation process.

The Chair reported on the activities and events over the previous 12 months and thanked the Council and all the members for their support. In his report, he also thanked Ian for his help and support. He also remarked how sad it was that we had lost one of our Council members, Chris Lilley, two members, Sydney Bush and Doreen Lurie-King, as well as a dear Friend of the Shul, Olive Rozner, since last year. He also remarked on the very successful Open Night in February and the Communal Seder Service at Passover and thanked everyone who contributed to make these occasions a success. He also reported on a series of successful Festival Services, one of best Simchat Torah's we have had for a long time and a splendid BBQ afternoon to mark the 71st Anniversary of the founding of the State of Israel.

The Treasurer presented a very comprehensive explanation of the Shul accounts, which showed a significant increase in surplus from the previous year, due to the collection of outstanding subscriptions and outstanding payments, including two years of Gift Aid, being received. The Treasurer concluded her report by saying that as the Shul was in a healthy financial position, Shul subscriptions for 2019/20 would remain the same, but there would be an uncontrolled increase of £6.00 for the optional JJBS burial insurance. Subscription letters would be sent to all members and Friends of Ne've Shalom over the next few weeks. The Chair then thanked the Treasurer for all her hard work and dedication in managing the finances of the Shul and its legal obligations and proposed that the accounts be adopted by the AGM. This was seconded and approved unanimously, following which those present showed their appreciation.

The Secretary announced that she had received a number of nomination papers, but had only one nomination for each position. The Chair therefore declared that the members of the Shul Council were as follows:

The Chair confirmed that all subscribing members of the Shul had received timely notification of the amendments as required by section 44 of the Constitution and asked for any comments on the proposed amendments. The question of mixed burials was raised and the meeting was informed that the East Riding Council's regulations clearly stated that those with a non-Jewish status could not be interred in the Jewish section of Tranby Lane Cemetery. It was also pointed out that only full members of the Shul could be interred.

There being no further questions or comments, the meeting voted by over the requisite two-thirds of members present to approve the amendments, with one abstention and one against.

A suggestion was raised regarding the possibility of engaging a student Rabbi for selected Friday night/Shabbat morning services throughout the year. The Chair agreed to look into this.

We had some wonderful sermons within the services by Tim Harris, Jackie Lukes and Sarita Robinson. It was also pleasing that we again received such a generous response to our High Holy Day Appeal. I would also like to thank our Senior Warden, Malcolm Rosenberg, along with Ian Sugarman, for all their work and effort in organising the readings and the mitzvots.

This year's Simchat Torah Service was amazing. The turn-out was staggering and I know that your attendance at the Service made it an extra-special evening for our Kalah Torah and Chatan B'resheet, Gillian Smith and Tim Harris. Aimi provided this year's splendid catering and had made allowances for a large turn-out and was more than able to "feed the masses". During and after the Service, the Shul had a great fun atmosphere and it does show that when our community does pull together a good time is had by all. Malcolm Rosenberg led this year's tremendous service and I received truly remarkable feedback about the service. Well done Malcolm.

Ian Sugarman was duly elected as the Chairman of the Reform Movement Northern Network group. Our own Sarita Robinson has been promoted to the Reform Movement's Director of Community Partnership (North) mazeltov to you both.

We took part in the Hull Heritage open day when we opened the Shul doors to the public. The event was a huge success and we had in excess of 60 people visiting the Shul. Thank you to all the helpers who made this possible.

Following the Tree of Life Synagogue shootings in Pittsburgh on 27 October, Aimi lead a truly moving memorial service for the victims, which took place during the following Friday Night Service. Thank you Aimi. A large number of members and friends of Ne've Shalom attended the Annual Service of Remembrance at the Pryme Street Synagogue. One of our members, Andrew Percy MP, was an invited guest. During the course of the year we have held several film shows. We have had a fantastic turn out from both Shuls and all enjoyed the cinema style snacks and drinks provided by Aimi.

Our Hebrew reading and conversion classes have now recommenced again for Sarah, Rebecca and Adrian. I wish them all well on the amazing journey they are taking. I'd like to thank Deborah Wrapson for giving up every other Sunday morning to help those wanting to learn to read Hebrew and also to Ian Sugarman for running the conversion classes.

Audrey continues to visit the sick and Ian has been kept busy as the Hull and East Yorkshire Hospitals NHS Trust's Jewish chaplain, training the staff on Jewish traditions and visiting the sick in hospital. Malcolm is in the process of been appointed as the Prison Chaplain. A word of warning. Please keep out of hospital or jail, otherwise, you will receive a visit from one of these three!

We continue to be well represented in the media, especially on BBC Radio Humberside, who regularly request our member's contributions to their Sunday morning and weekday slots, as well as comments on current religious events. I'd like to thank Ian, Jackie, Aimi and Sarita for helping to represent our Shul so admirably.

At this point, I must mention a number of people who quietly carry out a range of important duties which allows our Shul to run. I know many of them don't do this for the thanks, but for the good of the Shul and at their own expense too, but I'd like to thank them anyway.

Firstly, to Henry Goldstone for his remarkable skill in lighting the candles on the memorial plaques each week and arranging the new plaques from the engraving company.

Also to Deborah Wrapson for co-ordinating the educational visits, talking about Judaism to schools, clubs and a whole range of organisations. Thanks go to the team of helpers which includes Joanne, Jackie, Tim, Ian, Malcolm, Shirley and Vicky.

To Audrey Sugarman, for organising the rota, and to all those other ladies, and some gentlemen, who prepared many of the Festival and special Kiddushim, especially Lesley Annis and Gillian Smith.

Elaine Winetroube for ensuring that the telephone answer phone messages left, are directed to correct people to deal with. Also special thanks to Elaine for obtaining a new fantastic deal for our gas and electric supplies saving us a staggering £600.00 per year!

Thank you also to Ian for dealing the endless e-mails, some nice and some not-so-nice, which arrive each day.

I would also like to thank Joanne Kearsley for all her hard work as the Shul Secretary and my special thanks to our Senior Warden, Malcolm Rosenberg, for ensuring the services run smoothly and 'jumping in' at last moment to take services. I would also like to thank our team excellent highly skilled Lay readers for taking the services and especially to Tony for reading the Torah in such wonderful style. Thanks also go to Ann for her splendid reading of the Haftarah.

I would like to give special thanks to Aimi for the endless hours and days she has given up looking after the Shul accounts, ensuring our creditors are paid on time and securing better deals for services provided to the Shul. Aimi has also looked after the Shul's legal affairs and we all know how very time consuming that can be. Please can I also thank her for standing in as the Vice Chair for the last few months, as well as all her continued support she have given me. Aimi also attended the Seminar regarding Safeguarding at Jacksons Row Synagogue in Manchester. Thank you so much.

As part of our ongoing commitment to the environment and the climate, we have now replaced 76% of our light fittings with new LED low energy light bulbs. We now recycle our waste in designated bins, we have reduced our use of plastic items within the Shul. During the year, it was also agreed to designate a toilet for gender-neutral use.

I still continue have some good links with in Humberside Police and I have been attending monthly meetings to help assist with this. During the year, I have reported some hate crime to the Police which have been directed at the Jewish Community. I'm pleased to report that following on from these reports, the Police have made several arrests.

We managed to draw down some money from the Community Security Trust (CST) during the year to fund a security company to guide the Shul door for services. Sadly, this funding ceased at end of March. The police ensure me they still patrol the area on a regular basis.

We have now got a new CCTV system in place to cover the Shul and the car parking area.

Sadly, James the caretaker retired last October. In the later years of being our caretaker, James was finding it hard to undertake the general upkeep and repairs of the Shul, which often resulted in the employment external contractors to complete these works. Due to this, it was deep regret that James decided to retire from his role. Luckily, Chris Cassidy came forward and offered his services to help maintain and clean the Shul assisted by Shirley. I'm delighted to report that the general upkeep and cleanliness of the Shul is now much improved from before and we have cut the costs down significantly by not employing external personnel. Thank you Chris and Shirley.

Finally, I received a comment from an upstanding member of the Shul whilst doing the announcements on the Bimah in the middle of winter. She said "What is about the past and present Chairman who always wear short sleeved shirts in the middle of winter." I explained that this was a pre-requisite of being the Chair of the Shul. You're always feeling the heat!

One other special person I would also thank is Helen, my wife, for all the help and support she has given to me over the last year as the Chair. Sorry if I have get on your nerves at times, dear, but thank you anyway.

Let's all hope that we all have a well and healthy next year!

TZOM TAMMUZ - FAST OF THE 17TH OF TAMMUZ

In addition to Yom Kippur, the Talmud (Tractate Rosh Hashana 18b) discusses four further fast days (based on Zechariah 8:19) that commemorate the destruction of the First and Second Temples and the exile of the Jewish People from their homeland. Three of these fast days are Tisha B'Av - the Ninth of Av, Tzom Gedaliah – the third of Tishri and Asara B'Tevet - the 10th of Tevet. The fourth, Tzom Tammuz is explained by Rabbi Moshe Lazerus in the following article which first appeared on the web site Aish.com

The 17th of Tammuz is a fast day commemorating the fall of Jerusalem, prior to the destruction of the first Temple. This also marks the beginning of a 3-week period of mourning, leading up to Tisha B'Av. If the 17th of Tammuz falls on Shabbat, as it does this year, the fast is postponed until Sunday (21 July 2019). The 17th of Tammuz is the first of four fast days mentioned in the prophets. The purpose of a fast day is to awaken our sense of loss over the destroyed Temple – and the subsequent Jewish journey into exile.

Agonizing over these events is meant to help us conquer those spiritual deficiencies which brought about these tragic events. Through the process of "Teshuva" – self-introspection and a commitment to improve – we have the power to transform tragedy into joy. In fact, the Talmud says that after the future redemption of Israel and the rebuilding of the Temple, these fast days will be re-dedicated as days of rejoicing and festivity. For as the prophet Zechariah says: the 17th of Tammuz will become a day of "joy to the House of Judah, and gladness and cheerful feasts."

Five great catastrophes occurred in Jewish history on the 17th of Tammuz:

- 1) Moses broke the tablets at Mount Sinai – in response to the sin of the Golden Calf.
- 2) The daily offerings in the First Temple were suspended during the siege of Jerusalem, after the Kohanim could no longer obtain animals.
- 3) Jerusalem's walls were breached, prior to the destruction of the Second Temple in 70 CE.
- 4) Prior to the Great Revolt, the Roman general Apostamos burned a Torah scroll – setting a precedent for the horrifying burning of Jewish books throughout the centuries.
- 5) An idolatrous image was placed in the Sanctuary of the Holy Temple – a brazen act of blasphemy and desecration.

(Originally, the fast was observed on the Ninth of Tammuz since that was the day Jerusalem fell prior to the destruction of the First Temple in 586 BCE. However, after Jerusalem fell on the 17th of Tammuz – prior to the destruction of the Second Temple – the Sages decided upon a combined observance for both tragedies, the 17th of Tammuz.)

Abstaining from food and drink is the external element of a fast day. On a deeper level, a fast day is an auspicious day, a day when G-d is accessible, waiting for us to repent.

The sages explain: "Every generation for which the Temple is not rebuilt, it is as though the Temple was destroyed for that generation." A fast day is not only a sad day, but an opportune day. It's a day when we are empowered to fix the cause of that destruction, so that our long exile will be ended and we will find ourselves living in messianic times; may that be very soon.
